
## **Everyday Debate:** A Course on Debate and Discussion



# Wise, Winsome, and Winning Discussion and Debate

## **Everyday Debate**

The goal of *Everyday Debate* is to teach you how to conduct wise, winsome, and winning discussion and debate. This class will teach you how to gather evidence and develop arguments to support a proposition; several common debate formats; the attitudes of a wise and winsome debater/discusser; and the various skills needed to conduct a strong debate.
