
Persuasive Writing:

Persuasive Writing

The goal of *The Argument Builder*, Persuasive Writing course is to teach you how to plan and build a persuasive argument for writing or for debate. This class provides excellent examples from master argument makers such as Greek and Roman Orators, Biblical Writers, Bacon, Montaigne and other more recent thinkers too. Following Aristotle's common topics, you'll be able to discover all lines of argument for a given topic as well as increasing your awareness of the red flags of fallacy along the way.

Attendance and Assignment Completion Policies
